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PROCEEDINGS

THE VIDEOGRAPHER: We are now going on the record at approximately 9:58 a.m.

Today's date is June 9, 2021.

This is media unit number 1 of the video recorded interview of witness for June 9, 2021, taken by special deputy for the New York Attorney General's Office in the matter of Independent Investigation Under New York State Executive Law Section 63(8).

This deposition is being held via
Zoom virtual conferencing. My name is
Ryan Gallagher. I'm the videographer.
The court reporter is Melissa Gilmore.
We're both from the firm Veritext Legal
Solutions.

At this time, all attorneys present will identify themselves for the record.

MS. CLARK: Hi. I'm Anne Clark.

I'm usually at the law firm of Vladeck,

Raskin & Clark. I'm appearing today as a special deputy to the first deputy attorney general. Ezra?

2	MR. CUKOR: My name is Ezra Cukor,
3	and I am also from the law firm of
4	Vladeck, Raskin & Clark.
5	MS. WANG: And I am Mariann Wang
6	from Cuti Hecker Wang, representing
7	Virginia Limmiatis, the witness today.
8	Alice?
9	MS. REITER: I'm Alice Reiter, also
10	from Cuti Hecker Wang, on behalf of
11	Mrs Ms. Limmiatis.
12	MR. KIM: Good morning. This is
13	Joon Kim, I just joined, with the law firm
14	of Cleary Gottlieb, and like Ms. Clark, am
15	acting in my capacity as a special deputy
16	of the New York Attorney General's Office.
17	THE VIDEOGRAPHER: At this time, the
18	court reporter will swear in the witness
19	and we can proceed.
20	VIRGINIA LIMMIATIS,
21	called as a witness, having been duly
22	placed under oath by a Notary Public, was
23	examined and testified as follows:
24	EXAMINATION BY
25	MS. CLARK:

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LIMMIATIS

Q. Good morning, Ms. Limmiatis. Thank you very much for coming forward and agreeing to meet with us today.

I just have to go over some sort of background stuff before we get started.

As we said at the outset, my name is Anne Clark, and I've been appointed a deputy to the first deputy attorney general.

The New York Attorney General has appointed two law firms, mine, Vladeck, Raskin & Clark, and Joon Kim's, Cleary, Gottlieb Steen & Hamilton, to conduct an independent investigation under New York Executive Law Section 63(8) into allegations of sexual harassment brought against Governor Andrew Cuomo, as well as the surrounding circumstances.

And you are here today pursuant to a subpoena that was issued in connection with that investigation.

As you are not somebody who has gone forward publicly, we will do our best to maintain confidentiality. We are conducting a confidential investigation.

LIMMIATIS

If we use information supplied by you, there will be a public report at the end of our investigation, but if, at the time we issue a report, you have still chosen not to step forward publicly, we have the ability to not use your name and to anonymize you so that the public won't know who it is.

That being said, you know, while the Attorney General's Office does aim to protect complainants who have not chosen to come forward publicly, the state is subject to Freedom of Information law and, you know, if there's litigation over that, no one can really control the outcome, although the Attorney General's Office has generally been successful in protecting that information.

I want to let you know that you should be protected from retaliation for participating in this. So if anything happens to you after today that you think is retaliation for you participating in the investigation, you should let your attorneys know and they will let us know right away because this is something that the Attorney

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LIMMIATIS

General's Office takes very seriously.

A. Okay.

Q. I want to note that, as you saw at the outset, this is being video recorded, and also note that you are under oath, which means you must testify truthfully just as if you were in a court of law sitting before a judge and jury. And your testimony is subject to penalty of perjury if you're not truthful.

At the end -- I will remind you again at the end, if you want to make any brief sworn statement, if there's anything that we didn't cover, anything you want to add, you will be permitted to make any statement you want at the conclusion.

We also have to tell you that, although this is a civil investigation, that the Attorney General's Office also has criminal enforcement powers. So you have the right to refuse to answer a question if to do so would incriminate you. Failure to answer a question can be held against you in civil proceedings, but not in criminal proceedings.

And if you have questions about that

LIMMIATIS

during the course of the proceedings, you can speak to your counsel about that.

You do have counsel present today.

You can consult with them about any sort of

privilege issue that may come up, whether it's

Fifth Amendment or attorney/client

communication.

As you see, we have a court reporter who is present in our virtual space here, and she needs to be able to take down everything we're saying to create a clear record. And so that it's clear and that her job is not made more difficult, a few ground rules.

One is it's best if we do not speak at the same time. So I will do my very best to make sure you have finished answering before I start talking and asking the next question, and this is not like a normal conversation, but even if you know where I'm headed with my question, let me get the whole question out, because if you start before I'm done, it makes the court reporter's job difficult.

In giving a response, even though there's a video, we still have the court

LIMMIATIS

reporter taking down a record. So nodding your head or shaking your head or saying uh-huh does not create a clear record. So if you do that, I'll ask you to give a verbal response.

If you don't know the answer to a question, just let me know. If you don't understand one of my questions, don't struggle or guess. Just let me know that, you know, whatever I said wasn't clear to you, and I will try to rephrase it in a way that makes sense.

Now, you are not going to have a chance to get a copy of this transcript to review it, but during the course of the day, if while we're talking, you realize that you need to add something or clarify something or change something you said earlier, sometimes when you start talking about a later incident, you remember something about something earlier.

Feel free to just let us know that you need to add or change something from a prior answer and we can put that on the record.

We shouldn't go too, too long today, but if at any point you need a break, just let us know. I'd ask that you answer any pending

2	question before we take a break, but otherwise
3	we can take breaks.
4	So, Ms. Limmiatis, are you alone in
5	the room that you're in or are you in a room
6	with anybody else?
7	A. I'm alone.
8	Q. Okay.
9	MS. CLARK: And Mariann and Alice,
10	are you guys both alone in the rooms
11	you're in?
12	MS. WANG: I will be alone in one
13	second, but in any event, no one can hear
14	me.
15	MR. REITER: Yes, I'm alone.
16	MS. CLARK: Okay.
17	Q. And we just want to confirm that you
18	and your counsel are not permitted to use any
19	technology to create a recording of the
20	proceeding, including screen capturing tools.
21	Is that understood?
22	MS. WANG: That's confirmed on our
23	end.
24	MS. REITER: Yes.
25	Q. And that we also need to confirm

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LIMMIATIS

that you and your counsel are not allowed to let anyone else listen in on these proceedings.

Is that confirmed?

MS. WANG: That's also confirmed, yes.

Q. And we're just going to direct that, during the course of the proceedings today, that you not, during any breaks or through text messages or anything, give sort of realtime updates to anyone as to what's going on.

And we need to tell you that

Executive Law Section 63(8), the provision

under which we're conducting this

investigation, prohibits you and your counsel

from telling anyone about what you testified to

today and the questions that we ask you.

So, you know, you're free, if you want, to tell people that you participated in this, but not the substance of what we discussed. And if you or your counsel have questions about that later, we can certainly answer any questions.

11	in 2010.
12	Q. When you joined , what
13	was your first position?
14	A. It's the position that I've held
15	since 2010. I work in strategic
16	communications.
17	Q. And why don't you explain a little
18	bit to us about what you do in your role in
19	strategic communications.
20	A. Sure. So I work on crisis
21	communications. I work in media outreach. I
22	develop holding statements, talking points.
23	I'm considered an asset as an advisor to our
24	executive leadership. So I work on strategic

communication that would basically entail

1	LIMMIATIS
2	looking at opportunities to convey messaging on
3	behalf of the company. So both external-facing
4	communications and internal communications. So
5	I do a lot of writing, promoting of the
6	programs that is making available
7	to organizations and to customers and looking
8	at short-term and long-term objectives to make
9	sure that storytelling is conveyed accurately.
10	So I work in capacity as well as a
11	public information officer on behalf of the
12	company during storms and crisis
13	communications. So, in general, what I do is
14	both external and internal communications on
15	behalf of the company.
16	Q. And who do you presently report to?
17	A. So, presently, I report to
18	. She's the
19	•
20	Q. And as part of your work with
21	, do you interact at all with
22	anyone in the Cuomo administration?
23	A. No, I do not.
24	Q. Outside of your work at
25	, do you have any connections to Governor

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LIMMIATIS

transfer of about 3,000 acres of land at the Salmon River. So, formally, the agreement was referred to as the Salmon River Land Transfer.

So we were working with the folks in the -- call it the DEC, who manages the Salmon River to put together a recognition of transfer of the 3,000 acres to the State of New York.

So this was the culmination of months and years of work and dedication of many people at to ensure that the agreement was signed, sealed and delivered and it was basically as a way to recognize the years of collaboration between and the state to ensure that the land transfer was publicly celebrated in the form of this media event at the Salmon River.

- Q. And what was your role, if any, in preparing for the event?
- A. So in my capacity working in communications, I worked with members of the DEC to ensure putting together messaging in the form of a press release and putting together

2	our subject matter experts to both attend the
3	event. And if asked, we would be able to put a
4	member of the group of subject matter experts
5	in front of a camera to talk on behalf of
6	to ensure that that messaging was
7	delivered to members of the media.
8	Q. And DEC, what does that stand for?
9	A. The Department of Environmental
10	Conservation.
11	Q. And who were you working with from
12	DEC on working on the messaging and putting the
13	event together?
14	A. I don't recall.
15	Q. And where was the event held?
16	A. At the Salmon River Fish Hatchery,
17	and I think the name of the town is Altmar, New
18	York, but it's at the Salmon River Fish
19	Hatchery.
20	Q. Prior to this event, had you ever
21	met the governor?
22	A. No.
23	Q. And putting aside the interaction
24	between you and the governor, what were the

sort of planned events for this event?

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LIMMIATIS

A. So the planned event began as

So in my capacity working with
my contact at the DEC to put together a press
release.

And then a few days before the actual press release, I understood, through my contact at the DEC, that the governor was going to be in the area, and so that the State of New York was actually going to be holding this press event.

So was not permitted to actually host the event, but it was then going to become a State of New York announcement at the Salmon River Fish Hatchery.

So, basically, the work that the DEC, my colleague at the DEC and I had put together for this announcement was then taken over by the state and it became their announcement on that day.

So it went from us leading the -- leading the announcement to us taking a backseat.

Q. And were you told -- once it became sort of a State of New York event, were you

2	told what sort of the schedule or plan was for
3	what was going to happen at the event?
4	A. No.
5	Q. Were you given any role to have
6	during the event? Were you told what you're
7	going to do either by the State of New York or
8	by ?
9	A. No. We were basically told that it
10	was a State of New York event and that we were
11	invited to serve as guests, so we could sit in
12	the audience.
13	Q. And who from who else, other than
14	you, from attended the event?
15	A. So my colleagues ,
16	•
17	Q. Anyone else?
18	A. Not that I recall.
19	Q. And do you recall what you were
20	wearing that day?
21	A. Yes. I had my branded
22	T-shirt and a pair of jeans.
23	MS. CLARK: And, Ezra, could you
24	pull up tab 2 and share that?
25	(Exhibit 2, Photograph, marked for

3	Q. And this is something that your
4	lawyer sent to us.
5	Do you recognize this?
6	A. I do.
7	Q. What is this?
8	A. That's me wearing my
9	T-shirt.
10	Q. And is it the exact same T-shirt you
11	were wearing that day or one similar to it or
12	something else?
13	A. It's the exact same T-shirt.
L 4	Q. Okay. And then it has the
15	logo across the top?
16	A. Yes.
17	Q. Okay.
18	MS. CLARK: Okay. You can take that
19	down, Ezra.
20	Q. Did you take any other photos at the
21	event that day?
22	A. No. I took photos of the event, but
23	that's it.
2 4	Q. And the photo that we just saw of
25	you in the T-shirt, was that taken at the event

Q. So you got to the event.

How many people were at the event?

A. It was a large group of people, as I recall. The governor's, I will call them media folks, planning and event folks had put together a really nice event with chairs and a canopy, a stage, as well as a dais where folks went on stage and delivered remarks.

So the seating was at capacity. And there were dozens of people standing behind those folks seated behind in a canopy area. So it was very, very well attended.

- Q. And were you seated or were you standing in the canopy area or somewhere else?
- A. I was seated at times, but also, you know, taking some photos and chatting with members of the media. So I was kind of on the move, which is typically what I do. And in my role in media relations, that's one of the things that we do is, you know, continue to be sort of a consensus builder and network as a representative of ______.

So I was both seated and walking around in the area.

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LIMMIATIS

- Q. And did you speak to any of the governor's press or communications people?

 A. I did not.
 - Q. And there was then some sort of formal program; is that right?
 - A. Yes, there was. So several folks did speak, including the governor, talking about various, I'll call it historical facts about the Salmon River, as well as economic development programs and what the state is trying to do, those initiatives, to buoy the area.

So very, very good, I will call it collaborative messaging with regard to partnerships from the state, and what they're trying to do in terms of environmental conservation.

So lots of members of sort of an entourage, if you will, or those subject matter experts from the state and local municipality talking about that partnership with the state and local leadership.

Q. And about how long did the speeches go on for?

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LIMMIATIS

- A. I'm going to guess about a half hour, maybe slightly longer.
- Q. And once the speeches ended, then what happened?
- A. Once the speeches ended, there were photographs taken, as you can see with the formal signing of the agreement, the formal land transfer agreement, and then the governor and his entourage moved down to the river's edge.
- Q. And what were they doing down at the river's edge?
- A. So there were members of the Salmon Fish Hatchery who had buckets of fish they were introducing into the river. And so I believe that he grabbed a bucket or was taking fish out of the bucket and then placing them in the river.
- Q. And where were you when the governor was putting the salmon into the river?
- A. So I was actually sort of part of the press corp who followed him from the formal stage area down to the river's edge, and there were a group of us who were kind of lined up in

1 LIMMIAT

sort of a wedding reception style, I will call it, line, on the side of the river watching him participate in introducing fish into the river.

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So there were a group of us members of the media who were lined up next to the river.

- Q. And about how many people were in this sort of reception line?
- A. I would -- I would guess there were probably maybe close to a dozen, a dozen folks between -- you know, I can't be exactly sure, but I would say upwards of about a dozen people.
- Q. And were you at one end or the other or somewhere in the middle?
- A. I was in the middle. There were members of the press to my right. I was in the middle, and there were a few to my left.
- Q. And after the governor put some salmon in the river, what happened next?
- A. Then he walked up to the sort of reception area, as I call it, receiving line of us members of the media, and he went from the first person up to the -- of the line, saying

2	hello and shaking folks' hands, exchanging, it
3	looked like, you know, just some well wishes.
4	And I was sort of in the middle of
5	that line, looking down at him, and looking
6	forward to saying hello and thinking maybe I
7	will have a chance to thank him for the
8	partnership. So I was in the middle of that
9	line.
10	Q. And as the governor was making his
11	way down the line before he got to you, did he
12	hug any of the people that he interacted with?
13	A. No.
14	Q. Did he kiss any of them?
15	A. No.
16	Q. Did he touch any of them other than
17	to shake their hand?
18	A. Not that I recall.
19	Q. So when the governor got to you,
20	what happened?
21	A. So I extended my hand and I said,
22	Governor, thank you so much for coming to
23	today's event. My name is Virginia Limmiatis.
24	I represent , and we are so

thrilled to have you here today and formalize

1	LIMMIATIS
2	this partnership. So I extended my hand. I
3	said some words of congratulations.
4	And then he walked right up close to
5	me and he put his finger on my shirt, starting
6	with the, and went across my
7	chest, my breasts, going from letter to letter
8	to letter, starting with the
9	, and he said, , I
10	know you.
11	Q. And was he using his right hand?
12	A. I believe he used his right hand.
13	Q. And he was, you know, like using his
14	index finger or was he using more than one
15	finger or
16	A. I think, as I recall, it went like
17	this. (Indicating.)
18	Q. Okay. You think his first two
19	fingers?
20	A. I believe so.
21	Q. And you just made a gesture. So he
22	put his fingers on the and then slid the
23	fingers across the logo?
24	A. Yes. Like this, touching each of

the letters, yep.

- Q. So for the written record, it looks
 like he was like pressing a letter and then
 sliding his finger over to the next letter, and
 pressing the next letter, and doing that
 throughout the words ; is that
 correct?
 - A. That's correct. That's correct.
 - Q. And when he got to the end of
 - , what happened next?
 - A. Then he looked up at me and he came over to the side of my face, to my cheek, and he whispered in my ear, so his face was right up to my cheek, and whispered in my ear and he said, I'm going to say that I see a spider on your shoulder.
 - Q. And when he was whispering in your ear, was his face touching your face?
 - A. Yes, it was.
 - Q. And up until this point, while he was saying ______, I know you, and the spider, did you say anything in response to any of those statements by the governor?
 - A. I did not. I was in absolute shock.
 - Q. So after he whispered in your ear

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LIMMIATIS

that he was going to say there was a spider on your shoulder, what happened next?

A. I looked down to see his hand going like this on my shoulder, going like this, trying to push something away. And I looked down to see, is there a spider.

I mean, my reaction was just I was appalled and shocked at what just happened, and I looked down and, of course, I did not see a spider.

And then I looked up at him and he could see that I was in shock, and he just looked up at me, and a few seconds later walked to the person to my right.

- Q. And when you gestured of him making a gesture like he was brushing off a spider, did you see any spider on you or on the ground after he made that gesture?
 - A. No, I did not.
- Q. You said he said he was going to brush your shoulder. The gesture you made looked like it was not at the top of your shoulder, but was more somewhere between your shoulder and your breast?

1	LIMMIATIS
2	A. Yes. So I don't know what this area
3	would be called, but yes, it's midway.
4	Q. Sort of below your collarbone?
5	A. Yes.
6	Q. And when he moved down to the rest
7	of the line, as he moved to the next person,
8	what, if anything, did you do?
9	A. I looked to my left and to my right
10	to see if someone was saying something to him,
11	like, hey, buddy, what are you doing, to look
12	to see, among my colleagues, if someone
13	recognized or saw what he just did to me.
1 4	And, apparently, the best way I can
15	describe it is the expression on the eyes of
16	the folks to my left and to my right, they were
17	just focused on him.
18	So my assumption, when I quickly
19	looked to my left and to my right, was that
20	people just didn't didn't see what he did.
21	They were focused on his eyes.
22	Q. And do you recall who was
23	immediately on your left and right?
2 4	A. I don't, but they were members of

the media.

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1	LIMMIATIS
2	Q. And did you see the governor then
3	proceed down the rest of the line?
4	A. Yes, I did.
5	Q. And did he touch anyone on the rest
6	of the line?
7	A. Outside of a handshake, I don't I
8	don't know.
9	Q. And what were you thinking when the
10	governor did this to you?
11	A. I was absolutely humiliated. It's
12	very difficult even talking about it. I was
13	absolutely profoundly humiliated and appalled.
L 4	I was in shock. Very negative feelings is the
15	best way to describe it.
16	And I left that area and I
17	immediately went up to my colleagues and told
18	them what happened.
19	Q. We'll get to that in one second.
20	After the governor went to the end
21	of the line, what did he do?
22	A. I believe that that group had
23	dispersed, and I don't know where he went after

that, but I could see that, at some point, he

was milling about the crowd of folks, but I

2	was I was with my team, and that's all I
3	remember at this point.
4	Q. So you said you went to your team.
5	Where were they?
6	A. They were up towards the stage area.
7	Q. And when you say your team, was it
8	the three people you identified that you recall
9	going?
10	A. Yes.
11	Q. And were they all together when you
12	walked up to them?
13	A. Yes, they were.
14	Q. So what happened when you approached
15	them?
16	A. My first recollection was I told
17	them that the governor touched me and that he
18	was telling me that there was a spider and made
19	gestures on my shoulder, on my body, on my
20	chest that there was a spider on my chest and
21	pretended to remove it.
22	And I believe that, at least the
23	folks who were there, could recognize that I
24	was very, very disturbed by it.

So I did share with these three

1 LIMMIATIS 2 folks what happened. 3 And when you said you told them that 0. the governor touched them, did you specifically 4 5 say that he touched your breasts or touched the 6 logo on the T-shirt you were wearing or 7 something on those lines? 8 Α. I told them that he touched the logo 9 on my chest. I don't believe I went into 10 detail with regard to my breasts, you know, I 11 was so embarrassed. I mean, how do you tell --12 how do you tell colleagues what happened. 13 But I did tell them that he touched 14 my T-shirt and the logo and I told them about 15 the spider. 16 And do you recall anything that they 17 said to you when you told them what happened? I don't recall specifically. I know 18 Α. 19 that my one colleague expressed 20 concern and support for me. 21 And how long had you known Ο. 22 23 Just for a few years. I had worked Α. 24 with him specifically on this project.

worked with him perhaps maybe six months on the

2	project. So this project specifically, about
3	six months.
4	Q. And what about ,
5	how long had you worked with them?
6	A. So I worked with since
7	joining the company in 2010, and
8	, similarly. I became familiar with
9	because of this project.
10	Q. After you told them, how much longer
11	did you stay at the event?
12	A. Not much longer, maybe maybe 20
13	minutes after that. So not a considerable
14	amount of time.
15	Q. And did you have any interactions
16	with the governor once you left the receiving
17	line?
18	A. No.
19	Q. And did you speak to anyone in the
20	governor's entourage whoops. I'll wait till
21	you stabilize that.
22	MS. WANG: I think you may have hit
23	the mute button, Virginia.
24	A. Sorry about this.
25	Q. That's okay. Okay.

The day started with excitement and joy, but quickly turned into something ugly because of the actions of the governor.

I was there as a professional to do my work. The governor turned a sincere gesture of simply extending my hand as an expression of gratitude for the state's partnership into a moment of profound shame and humiliation.

I don't pretend to know precisely what went through the governor's mind on that day, but I know that his actions were not ambiguous. He placed and pressed, then moved his finger across my breasts in a way that clearly meant to show me his power and his ability to control my body and my dignity.

And I do know what I felt. I felt he violated me. The governor made me feel dirty and cheap. He did not respect me as a professional and a contributor to the project.

Any adult man would have known that doing this was inappropriate and demeaning.

His behavior just a split second later, his leaning in and whispering that he was going to make up an excuse about a spider shows me that

he knew immediately that he had done something wrong and that he had to create a cover story.

I want to tell the governor that this is not about cancel culture. This is about consequences.

My coming forward is a direct result of the governor's March 3 press conference in which he said, I never touched anyone inappropriately.

He is lying again. He touched me inappropriately. I am compelled to come forward to tell the truth.

I do not know how to report what he did to me -- I didn't know how to report what he did to me at the time and was burdened by shame, but not coming forward now would make me complicit in his lie, and I won't do it.

I am a cancer survivor. I know an oppressive and destructive force when I see it. Thank you.
